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This report was written in compliance with the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010, which added Section 501(r) to the Internal Revenue Code. Section 501(r) imposes new requirements on non-profit hospitals to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) every three years and adopt an Implementation Strategy to meet the community health needs identified through such assessment. The CHNA must take into account input from persons who represent the broad interests of the community served by the hospital facility, including those with special knowledge of or expertise in public health, and be made widely available to the public.

Glossary of Terms

The following are definitions of key Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) terms referenced in this report. A shared understanding of these terms creates a foundation for interpreting the CHNA and developing partnerships to address the identified health needs.

Age-adjusted Rate

The incidence or mortality rate of a disease can depend on the age distribution of a community. Because chronic diseases and some cancers affect older adults disproportionately, a community with a higher number of older adults might have a higher mortality or incidence rate of some diseases than another community that may have younger people. An incidence or mortality rate that is **age-adjusted** takes into the consideration of the proportions of persons in corresponding age groups, which allows for more meaningful comparison between communities with different age distributions.

Benchmarks¹

Something that serves as a standard by which others may be measured or judged (Example: Healthy People 2020).

Community Assets

Those people, places and relationships that can conceivably be used in acting to bring about the most equitable functioning of a community (Example: FQHCs, primary care physicians, mental health providers).

Community Health Needs Assessment²(CHNA)

A systematic process involving the community to identify and analyze community health needs and assets.

Community Served

Based on regulations from the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, the community served is to be determined by each individual hospital. It is generally defined by a geographical location such as a city, county or metropolitan region. A community may also take into consideration certain hospital focus area (i.e., cancer, pediatrics) but should not be denied so narrowly as to intentionally exclude high needs groups such as the elderly or low income individuals.

Disease Burden

Disease burden refers to the impact of a health issue not only on the health of the individuals affected by it, but also the financial cost in addressing this health issue, such as public expenditures in addressing a health issue. The burden of disease can also refer to the disproportionate impact of a disease on certain populations, which may negatively affect their quality of life and socioeconomic status.

Health Indicator³

A characteristic of an individual, population, or environment which is subject to measurement (directly or indirectly) and can be used to describe one or more aspects of health of an individual or population (Examples: Percent of children overweight in Santa Clara County, Incidence of breast cancer in Santa Clara County).

Health Disparity

Diseases and health problems do not affect all populations in the same way. Health disparity refers to the disproportionate impact of a disease or a health problem on specific populations. Much of research literature on health disparity focuses on racial and ethnic differences in how these communities experience the diseases, but health disparity can be correlated with gender, age, and other factors, such as veteran, disability, and housing status.

Health Needs

Health outcomes that are disproportionately impacting a particular population. They are identified through interpretation and analysis of secondary data as well as primary data. (Example: breast cancer, obesity and overweight, asthma)

Health Outcomes⁴

Snapshots of diseases in a community that can be described in terms of both morbidity and mortality. They are measurable health indicators that may be used to identify and prioritize health needs. (Examples: breast cancer prevalence, lung cancer mortality)

Immediate Needs

Immediate needs are health needs that the community feels need an immediate intervention.

Implementation Strategy⁵

The non-profit hospital's plan for addressing the health needs identified through the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA).

Incidence⁶

A measure of the occurrence of new disease in a population of people at risk for the disease. (Example: 1,000 new cases of breast cancer in 2011)

Intermediate Needs

Intermediate needs are the health needs that the community feels need attention once the immediate needs have been addressed.

Mortality Rate

Mortality rate refers to the number of deaths in a population due to a disease. It is usually expressed as a density rate. (Example: x number of cases per 10,000 people).

Poverty Threshold⁷

Poverty thresholds are the dollar amounts used to determine poverty status, varying according to the size of the family and ages of the members. The same thresholds are used throughout the United States and are updated annually for inflation using the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U). Poverty thresholds are intended for use as a statistical yardstick, not as a complete description of what people and families need to live. Many government aid programs use a poverty measure to determine eligibility.

Prevalence⁸

The proportion of total population that currently has a given disease. (Example: 1,000 total cases of lung cancer in 2011)

Primary Data

New data that is collected or observed directly from first-hand experience. Typically, primary data collected for CHNA is qualitative in nature. (Example: Focus groups, key informants interviews)

Qualitative Data⁹

Typically descriptive in nature and not numerical; however, it can be coded into numeric categories for analysis. Qualitative data is considered to be more subjective than quantitative data but describes what is important to people who provide the information. (Example: Focus group data)

Quantitative Data¹⁰

Data that has numeric value. Quantitative data is considered to be more objective than qualitative data. (Example: State or National survey data)

Risk Factor¹¹

Characteristics (genetic, behavioral, and environmental exposures and sociocultural living conditions) that increase the probability that an individual will experience a disease (morbidity) or specific cause of death (mortality). Some risk factors can be changed (e.g., smoking) while others cannot (e.g., family history).

Secondary Data

Data that has already been collected and published by another party. Typically, secondary data collected for CHNA is quantitative in nature. (Examples: California Health Interview Survey (CHIS), Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS))

Executive Summary

A Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) was conducted by Valley Presbyterian Hospital for the 2.05 million residents of the hospital service area located in 48 ZIP codes in the San Fernando, Santa Clarita, and Antelope Valleys of Los Angeles County and a portion of the city of Simi Valley in Ventura County. This highly urbanized area is interspersed with rural communities, mountain ranges, and public open space. Valley Presbyterian Hospital serves this geographically, economically, and racially diverse region. Valley Presbyterian Hospital contracted with Valley Care Community Consortium (VCCC) to conduct a CHNA that complied with California's Senate Bill 697 and meets new requirements under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. VCCC has 15 years of experience in conducting CHNAs and has significant research expertise that harnesses the expertise of its diverse membership.

The process and the outcome of the CHNA are described in this report. To better understand the health needs in the hospital service area, VCCC reviewed numerous state and county sources, collected primary data, conducted a local literature review, and documented community assets and resources. A prioritization process resulted in a list of the 10 most immediate health needs for the hospital service area. A summary for each immediate health need is provided below, listed in order from highest to lowest priority.

1. **Health Education (Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate)** – Health education is a preventive approach that educates community residents on how to reduce the risk factors that could contribute to future ill health. Stakeholders noted that sensitivity to a patient's cultural and linguistic background is a crucial factor in creating action and building self-management skills.
2. **Diabetes** – Diabetes is a condition resulting from high blood sugar levels. Health care providers deal with the consequences of diabetes frequently, which may be managed by a variety of measures. In the hospital service area, 7.3% of adults 18+ years reported ever being diagnosed with diabetes (California Health Interview Survey, 2011-12). Chatsworth, Encino, Granada Hills, Mission Hills, Northridge, and Woodland Hills have higher diabetes rates compared to other hospital service area ZIP codes (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).
3. **Obesity** – Overweight and obesity is an accumulation of excess body fat that affects a person's overall health that is calculated by using the Body Mass Index (BMI). Overweight is a BMI equal to or more than 25, while obesity is a BMI over 30 (World Health Organization, 2012). Obesity has been identified as a health need among adults and children, and is a risk factor for chronic diseases such as hypertension, high cholesterol, heart disease, and diabetes. In the hospital service area, 19.9% of children in grades 5, 7, and 9 were obese, while 22.6% of adults were obese (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2013).
4. **Health Care Access/Access to Primary Care (Adult)** – A lack of access to care presents barriers to good health. The supply and accessibility of facilities and physicians, rate of uninsurance, financial hardship, transportation barriers, cultural competency, and

coverage limitations affect access. This indicator is relevant because a shortage of health professionals contributes to access and health status issues. Stakeholders noted that this issue was particularly acute for the adult population. While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, Los Angeles County had 80.67 primary care providers per 100,000 population (U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration, 2011).

5. **Preventive Screenings** – A Pap test, mammography, colonoscopies, and other preventive screenings are necessary to ensure the long-term health of the community and to reduce the health care costs. Being uninsured and cultural beliefs may be some of the barriers to accessing these services. Stakeholders expressed that cost savings would be achieved if patients obtained screenings regularly in order to detect health issues at an early stage.
6. **Teen Pregnancy** – Early teenage childbearing has been recognized to have negative consequences for adolescent mothers, their children, and society as a whole (California Department of Public Health, 2011). California’s teen birth rate declined from 35.2 births per 1,000 teens 15 to 19 years in 2008 to 32.1 births in 2009. Los Angeles County’s teen birth rate was 33.9 births per 1,000 teens (California Department of Public Health, 2011).
7. **Chronic Disease Care Management** – Chronic diseases are long-term illnesses, such as heart disease, cancer, and diabetes. Individuals with multiple chronic diseases need good case management in place to provide navigation through the health care system and education about managing their conditions. Statistics about key chronic diseases are discussed.
8. **Mental Health** –Stakeholders commented that depression was a common yet serious mental health issue that can be addressed effectively in a primary care setting. Medications, psychotherapies, and other methods can effectively treat people with depression (National Institute of Mental Health, 2013). In the hospital service area, 9.5% of adults 18+ years likely had serious psychological distress in the past year (California Health Interview Survey, 2011-12). Encino, Valley Village, and Studio City have higher rates of depression as compared to other ZIP codes in the hospital service area (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).
9. **Nutrition** – Nutrition is the intake of food based on the body’s dietary needs. Poor nutrition reduces immunity and makes a person more susceptible to diseases, physical/mental development issues, and reduction of productivity (World Health Organization, 2013). Stakeholders felt that the lack of affordable healthy foods, access to grocery stores that provide fresh fruits and vegetables, and a variety of other issues prevent individuals from making better food choices.
10. **Lack of Access to Specialty Care Providers** – Adequate specialty medical services are challenges faced when services are offered at certain health care facilities or minimal providers are available. Stakeholders mentioned specialty care access is a need for children and adults, although the implementation of federal health reform in 2014 may increase availability.

Introduction/Background

About Valley Presbyterian Hospital

Valley Presbyterian Hospital (VPH) opened its doors to the community in 1958 as a small, neighborhood provider of personalized medical care. Today, it is one of the largest and most prestigious full-service acute care facilities in the San Fernando Valley. Our 350-bed hospital serves thousands of families each year, with access to a wide range of medical expertise and leading-edge technology across all elements of care. Valley Presbyterian's nurses, therapists, technicians, and over 500 physicians represent virtually every specialty and most sub-specialties in the medical field, including cardiac care, orthopedics, maternal and child health, and oncology.

Valley Presbyterian Hospital is one of the facilities best equipped to care for heart attack patients within the critical 90 minutes following the onset of chest pain. The hospital provides rapid response to such heart attacks, as well as cardiac intervention and full surgery coverage any time, day or night. Valley Presbyterian Hospital is a Certified Stroke Center providing immediate access to specialized neurologist via RP-Lite telemedicine technology. This system includes an on-camera interface that allows our physicians to perform real-time consultations with a neurologist located hours away. Valley Presbyterian Hospital is also an Emergency Department Approved for Pediatrics (EDAP), which features specialized pediatric teams, including pediatric surgeons and anesthesiologists, who assemble, triage, and fast-track children to the care they urgently need. While the hospital's range of acute-care services and expertise has continued to expand, Valley Presbyterian is one of the region's only independent, non-profit, and locally governed institutions that provides an exceptional level of care responding to the needs of the community. As a result, the hospital has been voted "Best Medical Center" by the readers of The Daily News for six years in a row.

Definition of Hospital Service Area and Map

Valley Presbyterian Hospital defines the community served as those residents in a defined geographic area surrounding the hospital. Valley Presbyterian Hospital classified its service area as ZIP codes from which patients undergoing inpatient procedures were discharged in 2012. The hospital's Primary Service Area (PSA) was defined as the 19 ZIP codes that accounted for 76% of discharges. The Secondary Service Area (SSA) was comprised by an additional 29 ZIP codes, and accounted for comprised 15% of discharges. The remaining 9% of discharges were defined as the Tertiary Service Area (TSA). Valley Presbyterian Hospital defined its hospital service area as the 48 ZIP codes in our PSA and SSA, which is depicted by a map on Page 14.

Valley Presbyterian Hospital's service area includes the towns of Calabasas, Canoga Park, Canyon Country, Castaic, Chatsworth, Encino, Granada Hills, Lancaster, Mission Hills, Newhall, North Hills, North Hollywood, Northridge, Pacoima, Palmdale, Panorama City, Reseda, San Fernando, Santa Clarita, Sherman Oaks, Studio City, Sun Valley, Sunland, Sylmar, Tarzana, Tujunga, Valencia,

Valley Village, Van Nuys, West Hills, Winnetka, and Woodland Hills in Los Angeles County, and a portion of Simi Valley in Ventura County. Valley Presbyterian Hospital provided VCCC with a list of the 48 ZIP codes, which can be found in **Appendix A**. The communities that Valley Presbyterian Hospital serves have diverse geography and topography, vary across levels of socio-economic status and educational attainment levels, and experience differences in physical environment and overall access to required health services. As such, in addition to information about the health needs of the hospital service area as a whole, this report includes analysis about the significant needs in particular communities. This will allow Valley Presbyterian Hospital to create more targeted implementation strategies.

Description of Hospital Service Area

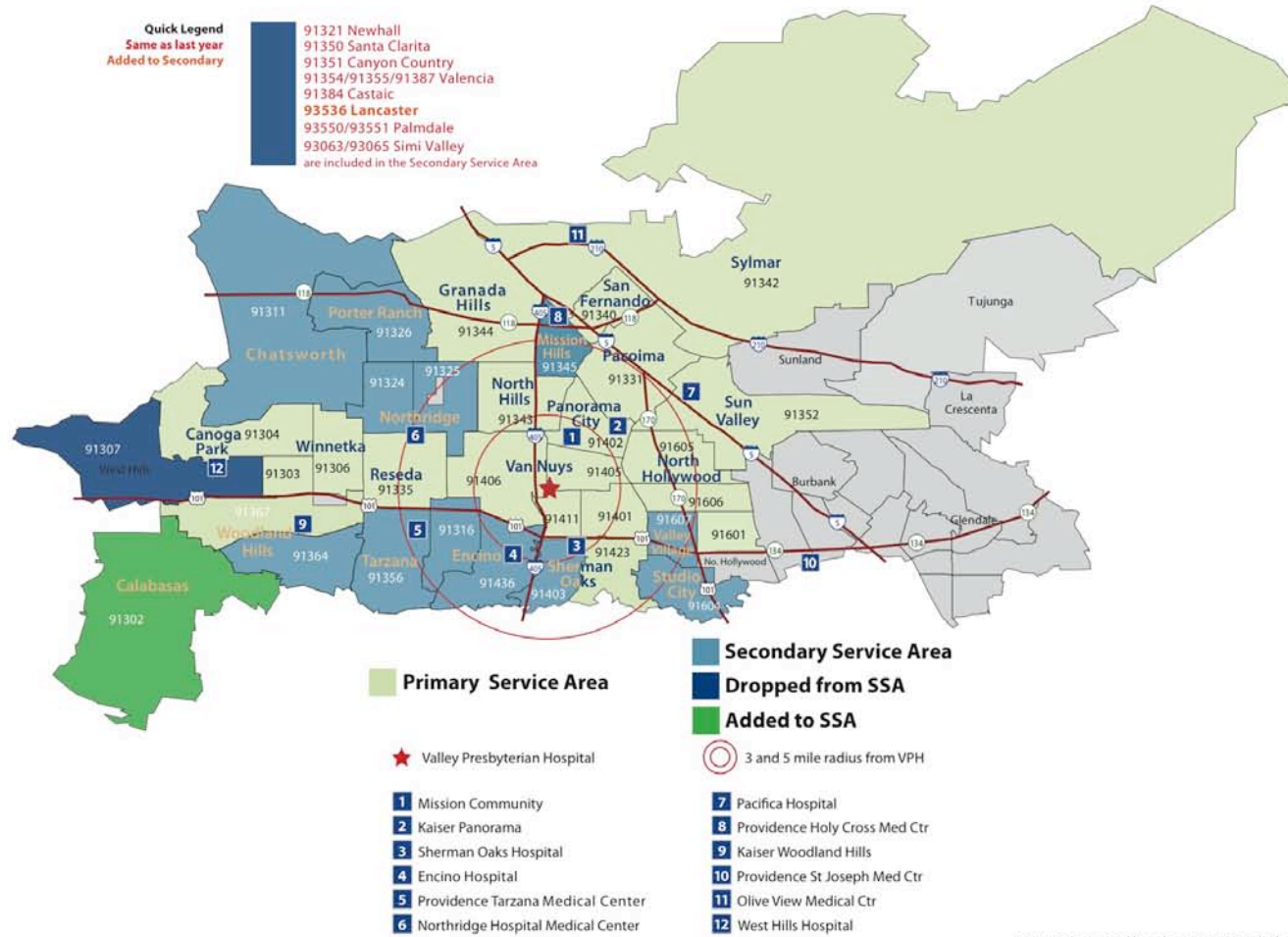
The catchment area served by Valley Presbyterian Hospital is bordered to the north by the Santa Susana Mountains, the Santa Clarita Valley, and the city of Lancaster and rural communities in the Antelope Valley; to the east by the communities of Canyon Country, Sylmar, Sun Valley, and Studio City and the city of Palmdale and rural communities in the Antelope Valley; to the south by the communities of Van Nuys, Encino, Tarzana and Woodland Hills, and the Santa Monica mountains; and to the west by the communities of Calabasas, Canoga Park, and Chatsworth in Los Angeles County and Simi Valley of Ventura County.

The hospital service area includes higher income and middle-class households adjacent to pockets of extreme poverty and ethnic mobility. The economy includes leading educational institutions (California State University, Northridge and a workforce-oriented community college and occupational training system) and Van Nuys airport, one of the busiest general aviation airports in the country. The entertainment, technology business services, and biomedical sectors have thrived, while manufacturing and aerospace have declined since the 1970s. In that timeframe, the economic base has shifted from durable goods to the services and retail sectors. Regarding service sector employment, higher wage occupations are found in motion picture production, software development, and health sciences, while lower wage industries include tourism, childcare, car wash, taxi driving, and retail. While this region is home to several large, widely -known companies, small-to-medium sized firms comprise 90% of businesses.

Racial/ethnic diversity has increased substantially due to immigration from countries including Mexico, El Salvador, Iran, Israel, Armenia, Vietnam, Korea, India, and China. A nearly equal percentage of the region's residents are Latino and non-Hispanic white at close to 40% each, with a significant yet smaller percentage of Asian/Pacific Islanders and blacks. Although the county and the state have begun to experience a slight increase in employment, the recovery has been slow following the global recession of 2009. While area residents are more educated, and higher proportions hold of graduate and professional degrees compared to the rest of the county, poverty remains a significant barrier for families in several communities.

Purpose of the Community Health Needs Assessment

Undertaking a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) is Valley Presbyterian Hospital's responsibility and privilege as a stand-alone nonprofit hospital, particularly so as to understand and better-serve its constituency. This report was written in compliance with the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Internal Revenue Code section 501(r), and California Senate Bill 697 (SB 697), which mandate hospital organizations under 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status to conduct a CHNA every three years. Valley Presbyterian Hospital has conducted CHNAs for the past two decades. Pursuant to the California requirement, non-profit hospitals submit annual Community Benefit reports, which summarize their contributions to their service areas. Valley Presbyterian Hospital contracted with VCCC to follow a process that will continue to comply with SB 697 and that also meets the new federal CHNA requirements.

Along with this report, Valley Presbyterian Hospital will develop an Implementation Strategy for each health need identified to better serve its hospital service area. These strategies will build on the hospital's assets and resources, as well as evidence-based strategies, wherever possible. The Implementation Strategy will be filed with the Internal Revenue Service using Form 990 Schedule H.

Community Health Needs Assessment Framework, Methodology, and Process

Valley Presbyterian Hospital contracted with VCCC given its expertise and experience in conducting CHNAs compliant with federal and state legislation. The intent was to develop a rigorous process that would yield meaningful results. A glossary of terms used in the CHNA is included on Pages 6 to 9. Because data collection, review, and interpretation are the foundation of the CHNA process, the CHNA includes a review of secondary and primary data. Data sources describing the hospital service area were used whenever possible, with a preference for California sources. When California data sources were not available, national data sources were used.

VCCC gathered numerous indicators from secondary data sources at a local, state, and national level from February to August 2013. **Appendix C** contains a data source list, and **Appendix D** includes supplemental data tables in addition to those provided in the main report. The CHNA Toolkit (<http://www.CHNA.org>) is a publicly accessible web-based platform designed to assist hospitals and other organizations seeking to better understand the needs and assets of their communities, and to collaborate to make measurable improvements in community health and well-being. Since the toolkit is undergoing continual enhancements, certain indicators may have been updated since the data was obtained for this report. In addition, local data was compared to state and national information

to gauge how residents in the hospital service area are faring, and indicators were benchmarked against Healthy People 2020 goals when available.¹²

In addition to reviewing secondary data, VCCC collected primary data. The CHNA team solicited community input during a 10-month period through a series of forums and focus groups; these events included over 660 residents and professionals spanning multiple disciplines, and representing a broad cross-section of the hospital service area. The CHNA team asked local public health experts, community leaders, and residents to identify issues that most impacted the health of the community. Paper and online surveys were collected and analyzed for common themes. The data collection instruments are provided in **Appendix E**. The CHNA team also inventoried existing community assets and resources, which can be found in **Appendix F**. Over 40 intermediate health needs were identified, which are summarized in **Appendix G**.

After community residents identified the intermediate health needs, the CHNA team brought together health care experts and civic leaders in August 2013 to prioritize the list into 10 immediate health needs for the hospital service area. Summaries of the initial list of health needs were distributed in advance of the meeting, and participants reached consensus through a two-stage voting approach combined with discussion. Additional information about how the data for the CHNA was obtained, the process for consulting with persons representing the community's interests, VCCC's background and experience in conducting CHNAs, and hospital utilization data for Valley Presbyterian may be found in **Methodological Appendices I to V**.

Data Limitations and Information Gaps

Quantitative data was used as secondary sources, and includes a robust set of indicators that, when taken together, enable an examination of the broad health needs faced by a community. However, some limitations presented themselves considering some data were only available at a county level, making an assessment of health needs at a neighborhood or ZIP code level challenging. Moreover, disaggregated data around age, ethnicity, race, and gender were not available for many data indicators, which limited the ability to examine disparities of health issues within the community. The timeframe also restricted the collection of complete information (i.e., updated information on programs) on assets available in the community. Due to the persistent budget cuts that have occurred over the last several years as a result of the 2009 recession, many community-based programs in the hospital service area were curtailed or eliminated.

Socio-Demographic and Health Data

This section provides an overview of key statistics that paint a picture of socially, culturally, and economically diverse populations encompassed by the Valley Presbyterian Hospital service area. Disparities experienced by certain communities are described where information is available.

Socio-Demographic Profile

Community Need Index

Nineteen ZIP codes in the hospital service area have approximately 500,000 residents who fall into the highest needs category as defined by a widely used indicator, which is a resource for public health planning to assess community need and strategically allocate resources (Dignity Health, Community Need Index™, 2013).

Canoga Park, Lancaster, Newhall, North Hills, North Hollywood, Northridge, Pacoima, Palmdale, Panorama City, Reseda, San Fernando, Sun Valley, Tujunga, Van Nuys, and Winnetka are the communities in which the 19 ZIP codes are located. A table ranking the CNI scores by level of need is contained in **Appendix G**.

Population

Valley Presbyterian Hospital serves 2.05 million residents in a region more densely populated at 2,404.77 residents per square mile compared to the state (235.19) and nation (86.06). High population density could contribute to more communicable health issues (**Table 1**).

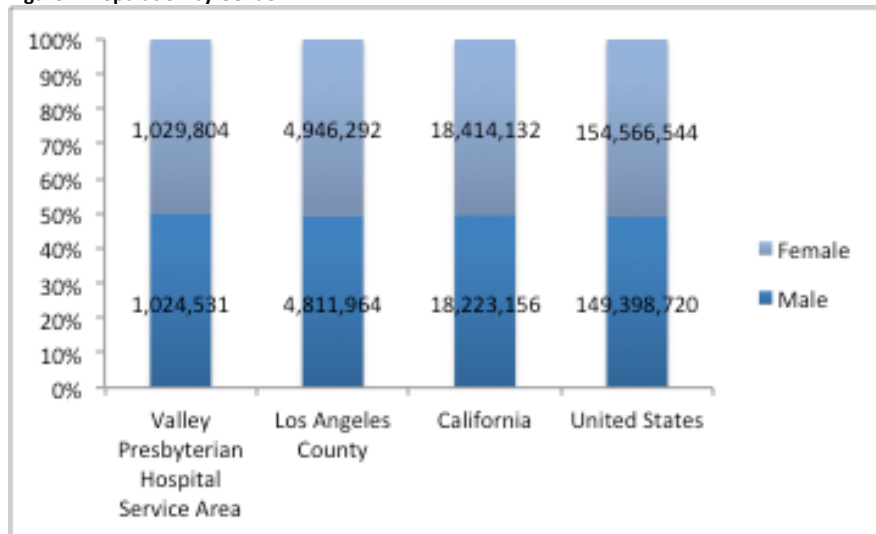

Gender in the hospital service area is similarly distributed with 49.96% male and 50.04% female, which are consistent with county, state, and national figures (**Figure 2**).

Figure 2. Population by Gender

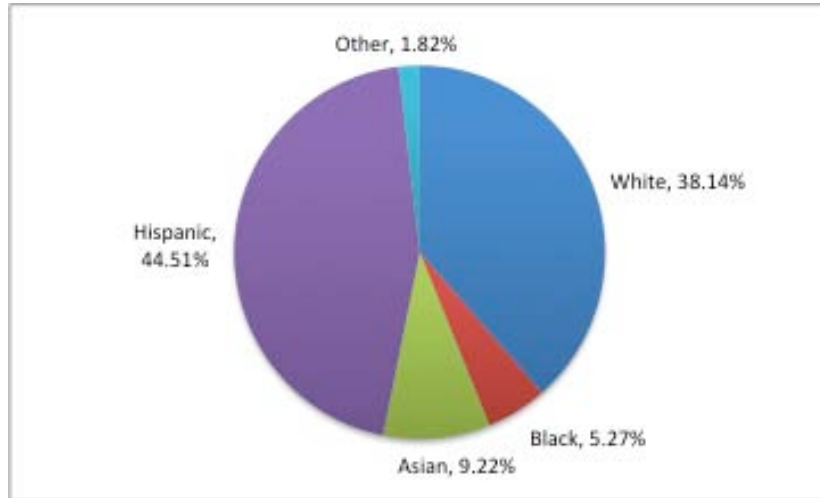

Race/Ethnicity

Latinos comprise the largest racial/ethnic group in the hospital service area at 44.51%, followed by non-Hispanic white (38.14%), Asian (9.22%), black (5.27%), and other (1.82%) (**Figure 3**).

Figure 3. Racial/Ethnic Distribution, Valley Presbyterian Hospital Service Area



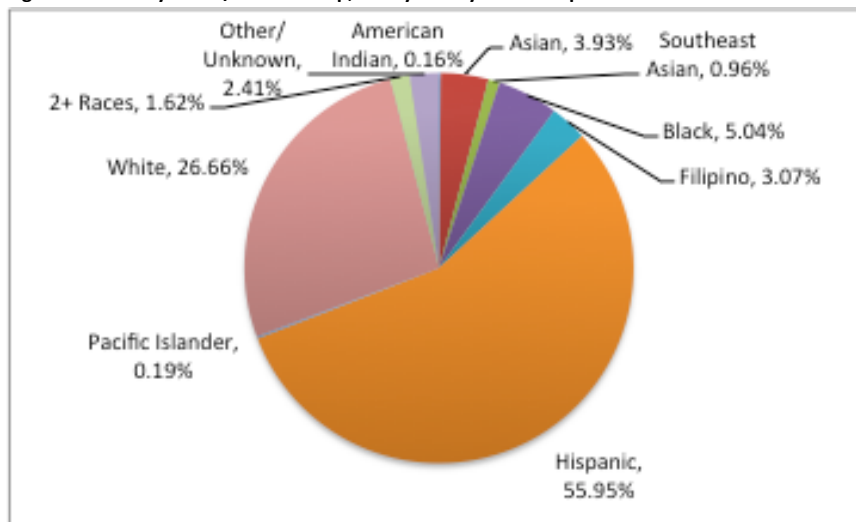

Calabasas, Encino, Sherman Oaks, Studio City, Tarzana, and Woodland Hills have a non-Hispanic white population exceeding 70%. Panorama City, Pacoima, Sun Valley, and Sylmar have a Latino population of 70% to 92%. Lancaster and Palmdale have a Black population of over 10%. Chatsworth, Granada Hills, North Hills, Northridge, Valencia, and Winnetka have an Asian presence of 15% or more (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Births

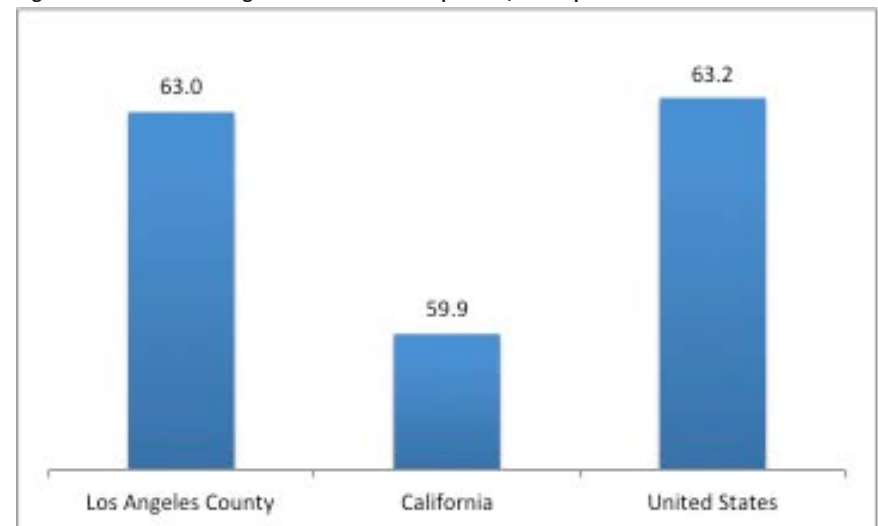
Valley Presbyterian Hospital has 4,200 births each year. Hispanic mothers accounted for over one-half of births in the hospital service area. Another one-quarter occurred in the non-Hispanic white population. Seven percent of births occurred for Asian/Pacific Islander mothers, and the remaining 4% were among mothers of two or more races, other/unknown, and American Indian (**Figure 4**). The general fertility rate among women 15 to 44 years was the same for the hospital service area (63.0) as the nation (63.2) but higher than the state figure (59.0) per 100,000 population (**Figure 5**).

Figure 5. Birth Rate among Women 15-44 Years per 100,000 Population



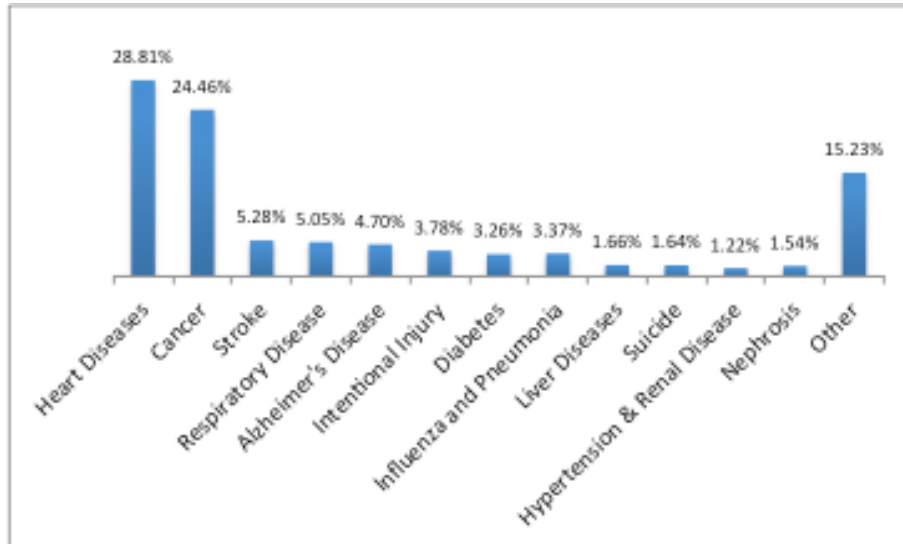

Canoga Park, Canyon Country, Newhall, North Hills, North Hollywood, Pacoima, Palmdale, Panorama City, San Fernando, Sun Valley, Tujunga, and Van Nuys experienced high birth rates among teenage mothers 15 to 19 years (U.S. Census Bureau, 2007-2011 American Community Survey).

Mortality

Heart diseases and cancer are the top two leading causes of death in the hospital service area, consistent with state and national data (Figure 6).

Figure 6. Mortality by Cause, Valley Presbyterian Hospital Service Area

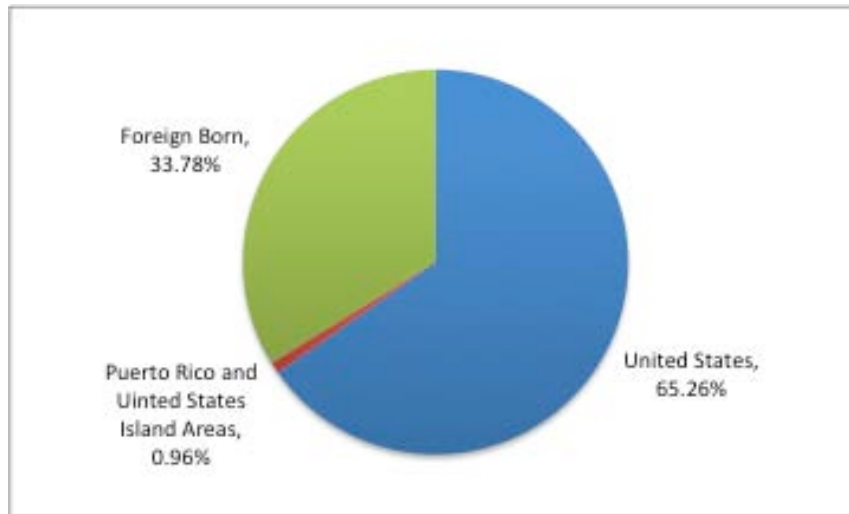

Foreign Born

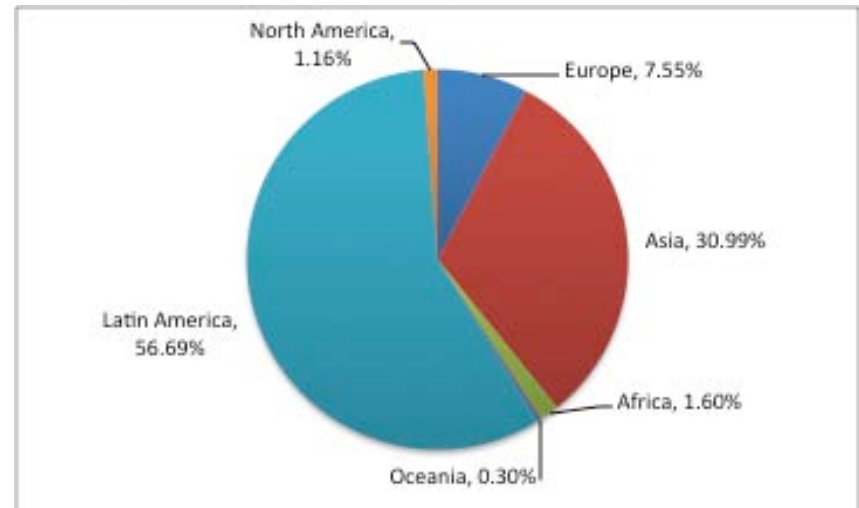
One-third of residents in the hospital service area are born outside of the United States (**Figure 7**). Latin America accounted for over one-half of the population born outside of the United States, followed by nearly one-third from Asian countries. Nearly 8% of residents were born in Europe, with the remaining 2% from Africa, North America, and Oceania (**Figure 8**).

Figure 8. Region of Birth, Valley Presbyterian Hospital Service Area

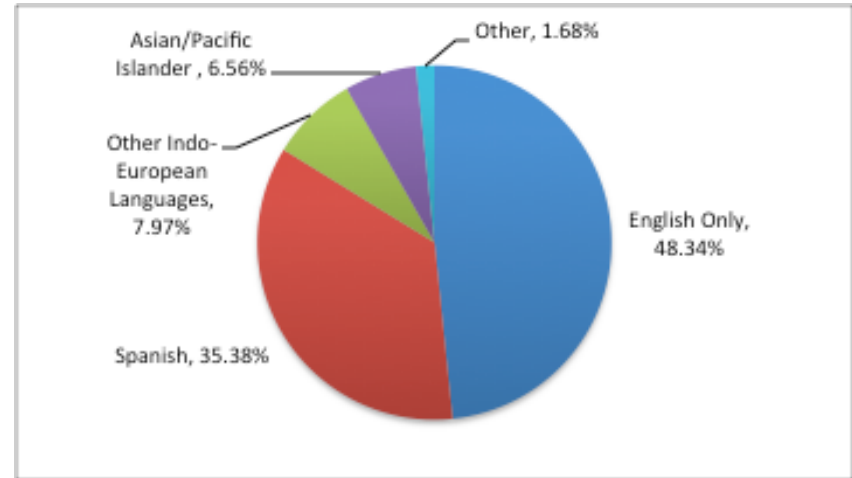

Language Preference and English Proficiency

Almost one-half of residents in the hospital service area speak English at home, followed by Spanish (35.38%), other Indo-European (7.97%), Asian/Pacific Islander (6.56%), and Other (1.68%) (Figure 9). The inability to speak English can create barriers to health care access, provider communication, and health literacy and education. The hospital service area has a limited English proficient population one and half times larger compared to the nation and 16% greater than the state (Table 2). Canoga Park, North Hills, North Hollywood, Reseda, Pacoima, Panorama City, Sun Valley, Van Nuys, and Winnetka had a high percentage of limited English proficient residents from 31% to 47% (U.S. Census Bureau, 2007-2011 American Community Survey).

Poverty and Household Income

Poverty is a key driver of health status in the community and has been identified as a barrier to accessing healthy foods, health care, dental care, and other services that lead a healthier life. Poverty and job loss are contributing factors to accessing health care services. Given the high cost of living in the hospital service area, we examined the population with incomes below 200% of the federal poverty level, defined as \$22,980 for an individual or \$47,100 for a family of four. By comparison, the basic cost of living for a family of four in Los Angeles County is \$51,301 annually (Insight Center for Community Economic Development, 2011).

The hospital service area has a 7% higher share of the population below 200% of the federal poverty level as compared to the nation and a 4% larger proportion than the state (**Table 3**).

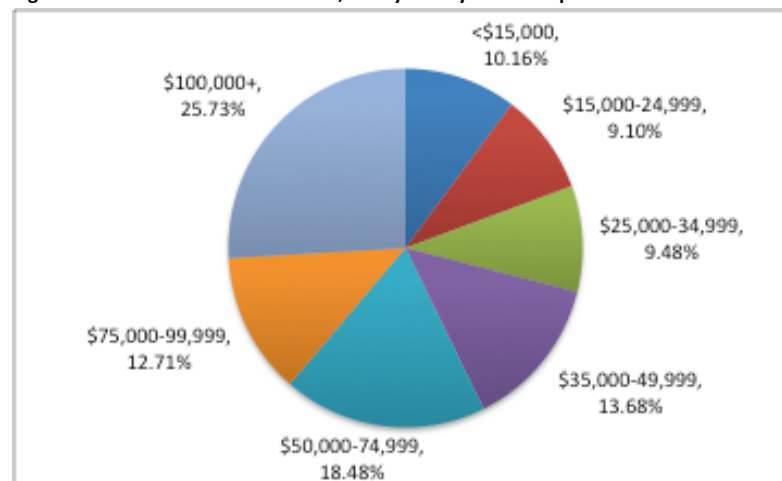

Four in ten of households in the hospital service area have an annual income less than \$50,000 (**Figure 10**). Communities with a proportion of low-income households ranging from 50% to 69% include Canoga Park, Lancaster, North Hollywood, Pacoima, Palmdale, Panorama City, Reseda, San Fernando, Sun Valley, and Van Nuys (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Children in Poverty

Children between 0 and 18 years who live below the federal poverty level face greater barriers than adults. Poverty affects the parent’s ability to access health services, affordable housing, healthy food, and other services that impact a child’s overall health. The hospital service area has a higher percentage of children in poverty than the state and nation, but lower compared to the countywide rate (**Table 4**).

Unemployment Rate

The global recession of 2009 caused a dramatic increase in unemployment throughout the country and California. The state’s slow recovery from near bankruptcy could have contributed to the high unemployment rate. Community residents mentioned that job availability was a significant factor that contributes to the health of their community, which may be due to disproportionate loss of employment in low-skill labor and manufacturing compared to other middle-class sectors in the hospital service area. While Los Angeles County has a similar unemployment rate compared to the state, it is 29% higher than the national average (**Table 5**).

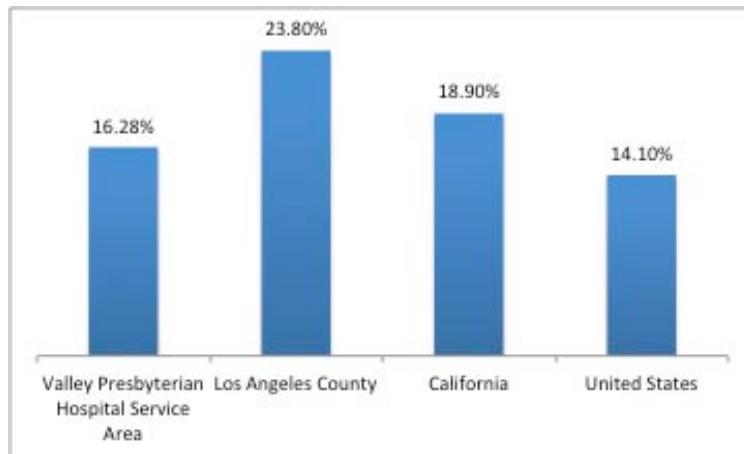

Educational Attainment

Educational attainment is the highest level of education completed in terms of the highest degree or the highest level of schooling completed (U.S. Census Bureau, 2009). Higher education levels are positively correlated with several favorable outcomes, such as higher incomes, employment rates, and better health (National Poverty Center, University of Michigan, 2007). Although the percentage of individuals lacking a high school diploma is lower in the hospital service area than the county and state, it is higher than the national figure (**Figure 11**).

Grandparents as Parents

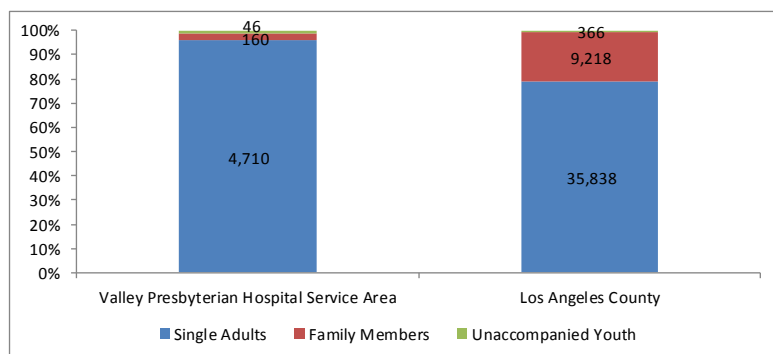
Grandparents raising grandchildren are a small yet very vulnerable group. They often assume this responsibility after the occurrence of an unexpected event, while encountering the financial difficulty of having an extra dependent without any added income. About two-fifths of parenting grandparents in California do not have enough income to meet basic needs, using 200% of the federal poverty level as an income standard due to the high cost of living in the state (UCLA Center for Health Policy Research and Insight Center for Community Economic Development, June 2013). Of grandparents living with their grandchildren, one-quarter are the primary caregivers. Encino, Granada Hills, Newhall, Northridge, Santa Clarita, Studio City, and Van Nuys have a high proportion of parenting grandparents, ranging from 35.56% to 48.89%.

Homelessness

One in ten homeless individuals in Los Angeles County resided in the hospital service area (**Figure 12**). A higher proportion of homeless in the hospital service area are single adults (95.81%) as compared to the county (78.90%) (Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count, Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority, 2011). The federal government defines chronic homelessness as “an unaccompanied disabled person who has been continuously homeless for over one year or has had at least four episodes of homelessness in three years; or a family is considered chronically homeless if at least one member meets the definition of chronic homelessness” (Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority, 2011). More than 60% of the chronically homeless population falls between 25 and 54 years of age.

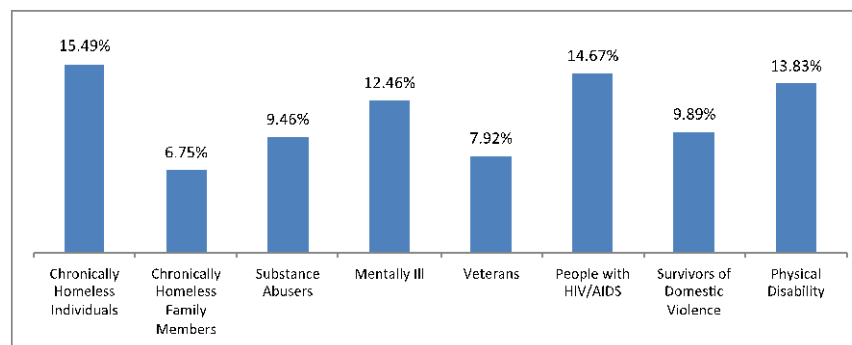
The percentage of Los Angeles County homeless subpopulations including chronically homeless individuals and families in the hospital service area is provided in the graph below (**Figure 13**). These individuals are likely to have poor health status and be more likely to utilize health, mental health, and social services. In addition, 7.5% of homeless individuals in the hospital service area had household incomes of less than 300% of the federal poverty level (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, Key Indicators of Health, March 2013).

Neighborhood Safety and Crime Statistics

Neighborhood conditions such as rates of crime and violence, appearance, and upkeep, have significant impacts on health outcomes. Living in less desirable neighborhoods have been associated with mortality, general health status, disability, birth outcomes, chronic conditions, health behaviors, and other risk factors for chronic disease, as well as with mental health, injuries, violence, and other important health indicators (Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, Commission to Build a Healthier America, 2008).

Crime statistics were reviewed for the hospital services area, which includes seven divisions of the Los Angeles Police Department and four patrol stations of the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department. Nominal changes in specific categories of crime are provided below, with the complete tables available in **Appendix C**.

For the Los Angeles Police Department divisions, crime decreased in the Devonshire and Foothill Areas with the exception of an increase in homicide. The Mission Area experienced an increase across the three major crime categories, which included rape, burglary/theft from a motor vehicle, personal/other theft, and child/spousal abuse. While the North Hollywood Area experienced an increase in property crimes, the West Valley Area had an uptick in violent crimes. The Topanga Area had a 44% increase in child/spousal abuse crimes and a smaller rise in property crimes. The Van Nuys Area experienced increases in homicide, aggravated assault, and personal/other theft.

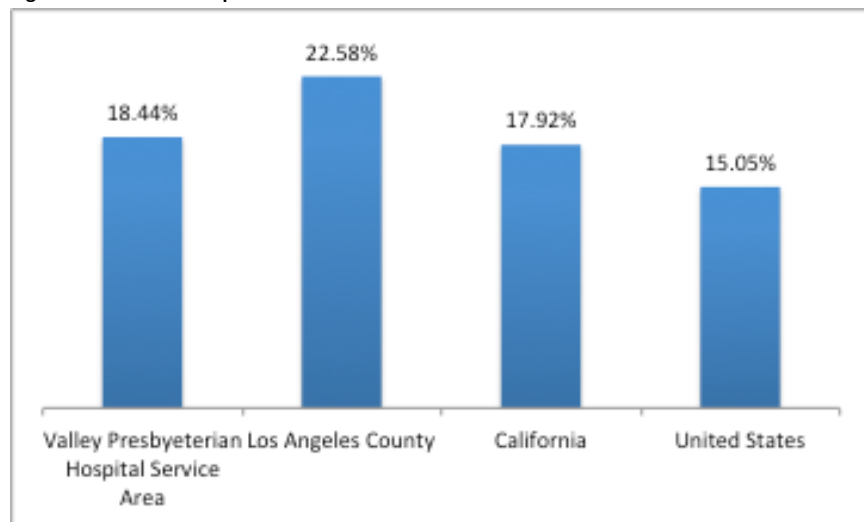
For the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department patrol stations, crime decreased with the exception of robbery in the Malibu/Lost Hills station.

Access to Health Care

Uninsured Population

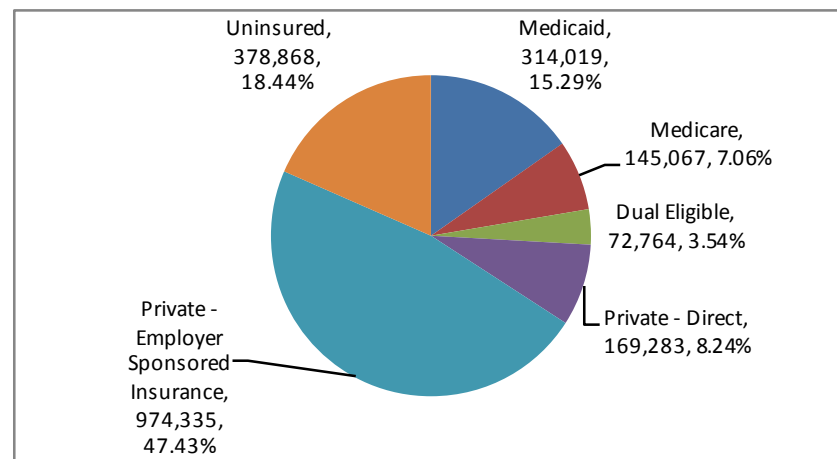
Individuals who do not have health insurance experience barriers to accessing primary, specialty, dental, and mental health care in a timely manner. Lacking insurance coverage is correlated with negative individual outcomes such as poorer health, as well as negative externalities, such as increased costs to the health care system. All of these critical issues relate to an increased disease burden in communities. The hospital service area has higher rates of uninsured (18.44%) compared to the national figure (15.05%) (**Figure 14**). The distribution of insurance coverage in the hospital service area is shown in the graph on the following page. Canoga Park, Lancaster, North Hills, North Hollywood, Palmdale, Panorama City, Sun Valley, and Van Nuys had a large share of uninsured ranging from 23% to 30% (**Figure 15**).

Lack of Access to Primary Care

Primary care includes services such as health screenings, routine tests, and vaccinations, and a lack of access to these services present barriers to good health, such as increased rates of morbidity, mortality and emergency hospitalizations. The supply and accessibility of facilities and physicians, uninsurance rate, financial hardship, transportation barriers, cultural competency, and coverage limitations affect access. Uninsured residents are the most vulnerable group to lacking access to primary care health professionals. The hospital service area’s primary care provider rate (80.67) falls below the state (83.20) and nation (84.70) per 100,000 population (**Table 6**).

Lack of a Consistent Source of Primary Care

Access to regular primary care is important to preventing major health issues and emergency department visits. Nearly one-third of adults aged 18 and older in Los Angeles County reported that they do not have at least one person they consider as their personal doctor or health care provider (**Table 7**). The hospital service area has 12% more people without a regular doctor compared to the state and 58% more than the nation.

Percent of Designated Population Underserved

Though some portions of Los Angeles County are densely populated and have high access to medical facilities, nearly 60% of residents in the hospital service area live in geographic areas that are designated as “Health Professional Shortage Areas” (HPSAs). These areas are defined as having a shortage of primary medical care, dental, or mental health professionals, and shortages of health professionals contribute to access and health status issues. The underserved population in the hospital service area is 11% larger than the state figure but 3% smaller than the national statistic (**Table 8**).

Lack of Social Support

Lack of social support is defined as the percent of adults over 18 years who reported that they did not receive sufficient social and emotional support most of the time when they needed it. Social and emotional support is critical for navigating the challenges of daily life, and is an important issue to consider in planning health programs. Los Angeles County had a shortage of 3,250 adults who did not receive adequate support per 100,000 population, as compared to the national figure (**Table 9**).

Low Birth Weight

Low birth weight is defined as a newborn weighing under 2,500 grams. Low birth weight puts infants at higher risk for health problems when born with a low birth weight, and highlights the existence of health disparities among regions. The hospital service area had 6% more low birth weight births compared to the state (**Table 10**).

Breastfeeding (Exclusive)

Breast milk is widely acknowledged as the most complete form of nutrition for infants, with a range of benefits for infants' health, growth, immunity and development (CDC, Healthy People 2010). Los Angeles County hospitals have some of the lowest exclusive breastfeeding rates in the state according to 2010 data from the California WIC Association. The report found that Los Angeles County ranks 43rd out of all counties in the state. The percentage of mothers breastfeeding exclusively in the hospital service area (26.05%) was considerably lower than the figures for the county (47.00%) and state (60.63%) (**Table 11**). Valley Presbyterian Hospital was one of several hospitals that received funding from First 5 LA to work toward becoming a Baby-Friendly Hospital in 2012. Mothers who give birth at Baby-Friendly hospitals and birthing centers are more likely to initiate exclusive breastfeeding and more likely to sustain breastfeeding at six months and one year of age, perhaps because of the institutional support for breastfeeding at these facilities. The California WIC Association report's data from three years ago does not reflect the impact of Valley Presbyterian Hospital's reforms and policies, which have dramatically increased to nearly 30% today from 4% in 2011.

Prenatal Care

Prenatal visits educate mothers on important health issues, such as their diet and nutrition, exercise, immunizations, weight gain, and abstaining from drugs and alcohol. Engaging in prenatal care decreases the likelihood of maternal and infant health risks. This indicator can also highlight a lack of access to preventive care, a lack of health knowledge, insufficient provider outreach, and/or social barriers preventing utilization of services. The hospital service area (2.47%) has a lower percentage of mothers receiving late or no prenatal care as compared to the state (3.14%) (**Table 12**).

Chronic Disease Prevalence and Incidence

Arthritis

As the leading cause of disability in the nation, arthritis refers to diseases and conditions, such as rheumatoid arthritis, childhood arthritis, fibromyalgia, gout, general arthritis, osteoarthritis and systemic lupus, which affect joints, the surrounding tissue, and other connective tissue (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2006). The percentage of the adult population ever diagnosed with arthritis or a related condition is lower in the hospital service area and the county than the state figure (**Table 13**). Calabasas, Chatsworth, Encino, Sherman Oaks, West Hills, and Woodland Hills have higher rates of arthritis prevalence, which may be due to better access to medical care and resulting diagnosis of the condition (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Diabetes

Diabetes is a prevalent problem in the U.S. that may indicate an unhealthy lifestyle and puts individuals at risk for further health issues. There are three types: Type I where the pancreas produces little or no insulin, Type II where the body becomes resistant to insulin, and gestational diabetes is when pregnant women who are free of diabetes in the past develop high blood sugar. Type II, although the most common form, is also preventable by consuming whole grains, fruits and vegetables, limiting high fat or calorie foods, lean meat, fish, low-fat dairy products, reducing sweetened drinks, losing excess body weight, and regular physical activity.

The population with diabetes in Valley Presbyterian Hospital's service area is roughly the same as the county and state, but better than nation (8.77%). Diabetes prevalence has increased by 50% from 1997 to 2011 in Los Angeles County, with a higher percentage among Latinos, African Americans and Caucasians (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2012) (**Table 14**). The rate for diabetes hospitalizations is higher for the hospital service area (11.10 per 10,000 population) than the statewide average (10.40 per 10,000 population). This greater cost may be due to poor management of diabetes or other related complications (**Table 15**).

Obesity

Although overweight and obesity rates have stabilized in California and across most of the nation, they have increased dramatically over the last three decades (F as in Fat, Trust for America’s Health, 2013). These conditions are measures of excess weight (measured by an individual’s Body Mass Index or BMI). Being overweight or obese puts an individual at risk for more complicated health issues including heart disease and Type II diabetes, strokes, arthritis, and cancers. Overweight and obesity are largely preventable and are prevalent among adults and children (The Obesity Epidemic, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2011). Likely determinants may include physical inactivity, eating habits, fast food restaurant availability, and low access of grocery stores and parks.

Fitnessgram physical fitness test results show that children in grades 5, 7, and 9 in the hospital service area have a higher proportion or overweight and obese youth as compared to the state (**Table 16**). The proportion of overweight and obese adults in the hospital service area is lower than the county and state (**Table 17**).

Cardiovascular Disease

Cardiovascular disease is a leading cause of death in the U.S., includes coronary heart disease and stroke, and is related to high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and heart attacks. Coronary heart disease occurs when a waxy, fat-like substance called plaque starts building up in the arteries that supply blood to the heart. Stroke occurs when a blood clot blocks the blood supply to the brain or a blood vessel in the brain bursts. There are two types of strokes: the majority are ischemic strokes at 85%, in which a blood clot or plaque blocks the blood supply; the second type is hemorrhagic, in which a blood vessel in the brain bursts. Risk factors include high blood cholesterol, high blood pressure (hypertension), diabetes, tobacco use, overweight, obesity, diet, lack of physical activity, alcohol use, and family history, age, gender, and ethnicity (CDC, Heart Disease and Stroke, 2012). A heart attack occurs when blood flow to a part of your heart is blocked for a long enough time that part of the heart muscle is damaged or dies. Heart failure is often a long-term condition, but it can sometimes develop suddenly. It can be caused by many different heart problems, which cause the heart to become unable to pump enough oxygen-rich blood to the rest of your body. As the 'heart's pumping becomes less effective, congestive heart failure may occur. The most common cause of heart failure is coronary artery disease, a narrowing of the small blood vessels that supply blood and oxygen to the heart. High blood pressure that is not well controlled may also lead to heart failure. Angina pectoris is chest pain due to ischemia of the heart muscle, generally due to obstruction or spasm of the coronary arteries.

Table 18 describes the heart disease prevalence rates in Valley Presbyterian Hospital's service area, Los Angeles County, and California. While heart disease prevalence in the hospital service area is comparable to the state figure, the service area's mortality rate is 5% more than the county, 17% more than the state, and 53% higher than the Healthy People 2020 benchmark (**Table 19**).

Breast Cancer

Breast cancer is a cancer that forms in the tissues of the breast, usually in milk ducts and glands. Even though breast cancer can occur in both women and men, it is rare among the male population. Breast cancer risk factors include obesity, alcohol consumption, and family history of breast cancer, and higher incidence can be further attributed to a lack of breast cancer screenings. Engaging in regular exercise, having children at or before age 35 and breastfeeding can reduce the risk for breast cancer. Breast cancer can be detected by mammogram (breast cancer screening), which is recommended between the ages of 40 to 70 and reduces breast cancer mortality (National Cancer Institute, Breast Cancer, 2012).

Breast cancer incidence in the hospital service area falls below the state and national averages (**Table 20**). Breast cancer mortality in the hospital service area is similar to the Healthy People 2020 benchmark but lower than the statewide incidence (**Table 21**).

Cervical Cancer

Cervical cancer occurs in the tissue of the cervix, the organ connecting uterus and vagina. This slow-growing, and largely symptomless, cancer can be detected by a Pap smear test. Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) is the most common cause of cervical cancers; however, risky behaviors such as smoking can increase the risk for cervical cancer. Receiving regular screenings or the HPV vaccination are the most effective methods of reducing risk for cervical cancer. (NCI, What You Need to Know about Cervical Cancer, 2012). Cervical cancer incidence in the hospital service area is higher than the state and nation as well as Healthy People 2020 benchmark (**Table 22**).

Colorectal Cancer

Colorectal cancer develops over the course of several years by starting as a simple growth of tissue (polyp) or as a flat lesion in the lining of the colon or rectum. Colon cancer develops in the tissue of the colon, the longest part of the large intestine. Most colon cancers are cancers start in the cells that produce and release mucus and other fluids. Rectal cancer forms in the tissue of the rectum, the last part of the large intestine close to the anus. However, a cancer that starts at either of these areas is known as colorectal cancer. Risk factors for colorectal cancer include family history, age 50 years or more, or polyps in colon or rectum (NCI, 2012). With screening, growths in the colon or rectum can be detected early and removed before they progress to cancer. Colorectal cancer incidence in the hospital service area is slightly higher than the state and national averages (**Table 23**).

Mental Health

An individual with good mental health is defined as someone functioning at a satisfactory level of emotional and behavioral adjustment. Poor mental health is associated with a stressful work environment, risk of violence, rapid social changes, unhealthy lifestyle, and ill health (World Health Organization, 2010). A measure of general poor mental health status is important because it may indicate a demand for mental health/behavioral services.

Individuals with poor mental health in the service area were measured as those who have likely had serious psychological distress in the past year; the percentage of individuals with poor mental health in the hospital service area exceeds county and statewide rates (**Table 24**).

Conclusion

Results from the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) demonstrate that Valley Presbyterian Hospital serves 2.05 million residents in a geographically, economically, and racially diverse region with a rich array of existing assets and resources. However, the area has high population density along with rural communities. Six in 10 residents are Latino, Asian/Pacific Islander, and black, and one-third are born outside of the United States. The hospital service area has large pockets of low educational attainment, unemployment, limited English proficiency, and poverty; more uninsured, less access to primary care, and lower social support; and poorer outcomes on diabetes hospitalizations, mental health, selected disease mortality, and particular cancers. **Methodological Appendix V** summarizes the 10 immediate health needs identified by community leaders with expertise and knowledge in public health. Valley Presbyterian Hospital looks forward to partnering with local organizations to address the identified immediate health needs and create healthier communities.

Appendix F. Identified Health Needs Summary for the Prioritization Meeting

Valley Presbyterian Hospital: Identified Needs for Hospital Service Area

Valley Presbyterian Hospital subcontracted with Valley Care Community Consortium (VCCC) to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment, which included convening a series of community engagement events to solicit the priority health needs experienced by the residents in our hospital service area. VCCC conducted focus groups, surveys, community forums, and key informant interviews with a broad cross-section of over 660 professionals and residents representing multiple viewpoints. As a result, over 40 health needs were identified, which are summarized below. Please note that the identified needs are presented alphabetically since prioritizing them is the purpose of today's meeting, and secondary data describing relevant indicators are offered where available, at the ZIP code, hospital service, or county level depending on the data source.

Access to Physical and Mental Therapy (Elderly)

Access to physical therapy for the elderly is crucial to prevent falls and fall-related injuries, while mental therapy was identified because of hesitation in asking for help and the distrust of caregivers with personal belongings. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Access to Vision Care (Elderly)

Vision care is important to prevent falls, make mobility possible, and promote safety. The elderly may not seek services due to the high cost of eye exams and prescription eyeglasses. In the hospital service area, 18.3% of the population 65+ years did not have coverage for eye exams (California Health Interview Survey, 2003).

Affordable Insurance

Health insurance is a key driver of health status. Due to the current health care system and the cost of health care, people without health insurance may not receive needed health care. In the hospital service area, 18.44% of residents were uninsured. Canoga Park, Lancaster, North Hollywood, Palmdale, Panorama City, and Van Nuys had higher uninsured rates (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Affordable Long-Term Care

Affordable long-term care is an issue for the elderly and disabled since many insurance plans do not cover community-based supports and services. Offering affordable options will create a longer, healthier life for these vulnerable populations and their families, who shoulder high out-of-pocket costs, and the broader community.

Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Alzheimer's Disease

Alzheimer's disease is a chronic condition that consists of a loss or decline in memory and other thinking abilities. It is the most common form of dementia, has been linked to conditions affecting the brain, and can be found in other forms of memory loss (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2008). While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, 147,000 individuals in Los Angeles County have Alzheimer's disease, and 300,000 individuals provided care in the last month to someone with Alzheimer's disease or memory loss (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2008).

Arthritis

As the leading cause of disability in the nation, arthritis refers to diseases and conditions, such as rheumatoid arthritis, childhood arthritis, fibromyalgia, gout, general arthritis, osteoarthritis and systemic lupus, that affect joints, the surrounding tissue, and other connective tissue (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2006). In the hospital service area, 21.7% of adults 18+ years were ever diagnosed with arthritis (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2006). Calabasas, Chatsworth, Encino, Sherman Oaks, West Hills, and Woodland Hills have higher rates of arthritis prevalence, which may be due to better access to medical care (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Asthma

Asthma is a chronic lung condition where the airways get inflamed and narrow, causing wheezing, chest tightness, coughing, and shortness of breath. Asthma can affect people of all ages and frequently begins in the childhood (NIH: Asthma, 2012). In the hospital service area, 12.4% of residents reported ever being diagnosed with asthma (California Health Interview Survey, 2009). Encino, Sherman Oaks, Studio City, Tarzana, and Woodland Hills have higher rates of asthma prevalence (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Breast Cancer

Breast cancer is a cancer that forms in the breast tissue, usually in milk ducts and glands that produce milk. It is rare among the male population (NCI, 2012). While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, the breast cancer incidence in Los Angeles County is 116 per 100,000 population (CDC/NCI, 2006-2010). Chatsworth, Encino, San Fernando, and Woodland Hills have higher breast cancer rates (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Cervical Cancer

Cervical cancer occurs in the tissue of the cervix (the organ connecting uterus and vagina). This slow-growing, symptomless cancer can be detected by a Pap test. Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) almost always is the cause (NCI, 2012). While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, the cervical cancer incidence in Los Angeles County is 9.4 per 100,000 population (CDC/NCI, 2006-2010). Calabasas, Encino, Sherman Oaks, Studio City, Tarzana, Valley Village, and Woodland Hills have higher cervical cancer rates (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Specialty Care Access (Children and Adult)

Adequate specialty medical services are challenges faced when services are offered at certain health care facilities or minimal providers are available. Community residents and stakeholders mentioned specialty care access is a need for children and adults. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Chronic Disease Case Management

Chronic diseases are long-term illnesses, such as heart disease, cancer, and diabetes. Individuals with multiple chronic diseases need good case management in place to provide navigation through the health care system and education about managing their conditions. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Colorectal Cancer

Colorectal cancer is a cancer that develops in the colon or rectum. Risk factors include family history, age 50+ years, polyps in colon or rectum, smoking, diet, and history of cancer (NCI, 2012). While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, the colorectal cancer incidence in Los Angeles County is 44.3 per 100,000 population (CDC/NCI, 2006-2010). Encino, Sherman Oaks, Studio City, Tarzana, West Hills, and Woodland Hills have higher rates of colorectal prevalence (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Communication

Communication is important in accessing medical care. Health literacy is the capacity to obtain, process, and understand basic health information and services to make appropriate health decisions (CDC, 2013). Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD)

COPD is group of diseases that cause airflow blockage and breathing-related problems. Tobacco smoke is a key factor in the development of COPD, although exposure to air pollutants in the home and workplace, genetic factors, and respiratory infections play a role (CDC, 2012). Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Coronary Heart Disease

Coronary heart disease occurs when plaque builds inside the coronary artery, which supplies oxygen-rich blood to the heart muscle. When the plaque hardens or breaks, the coronary artery pathways becomes narrower reducing the flow of oxygen rich blood to the heart. When the plaque breaks away from the coronary artery it can cause a clot blocking blood flow through the coronary artery (NIH, 2012). In the hospital service area, 5.4% of the population reported ever being diagnosed with heart disease (California Health Interview Survey, 2009). Encino, Sunland, Studio City, Tarzana, Woodland Hills, and West Hills have higher rates of coronary heart disease prevalence (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Dental Care

For residents who live in areas where a dentist is not available or who cannot afford treatment, getting dental care can be difficult. This indicator is relevant because engaging in preventive behaviors decreases the likelihood of developing future health problems. While data was unavailable in the hospital service area, 44.3% of adults 18+ years reported not having received a dental exam within the past year (CDC, 2006-2010).

Dermatology

Dermatology is a specialty in which the wait time for an appointment is very long. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Diabetes

Diabetes is a condition resulting from high blood sugar levels. There are three types: Type I where the pancreas produces little or no insulin; Type II which is most commonly a result of overweight and obesity where the body becomes resistant to insulin; and gestational diabetes where pregnant women who are free of diabetes in the past develop high blood sugar (CDC, 2012). In the hospital service area, 6.6% of adults 18+ years reported ever being diagnosed with diabetes (California Health Interview Survey, 2009). Chatsworth, Encino, Granada Hills, Mission Hills, Northridge, and Woodland Hills have higher diabetes rates (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Fall and Mobility Issues

Lack of mobility the elderly and disabled creates difficulty in being independent. Community residents suggested having safe areas or assistance in walking. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Families and Foster Children

Foster children are temporary relocated out of home care due to parental abuse, neglect, or exploitation. (California Department of Social Services, 2007). Families who become responsible for foster children provide a supportive and stable environment until the child-family problems are resolved. While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, 18,523 children were in foster care in Los Angeles County (UC Berkeley, 2013).

Health Care Access/Access to Primary Care

A lack of access to care presents barriers to good health. The supply and accessibility of facilities and physicians, the rate of uninsurance, financial hardship, transportation barriers, cultural competency, and coverage limitations affect access. This indicator is relevant because a shortage of health professionals contributes to access and health status issues. While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, Los Angeles County had 80.67 primary care providers per 100,000 population (HRSA, 2011).

Health Education

Health education involves a trained health professional such as a health educator, nutritionist, dietician, or nurse teaching a patient about a specific health issue. Health education is a preventative approach that educates the community residents on how to reduce the risk factors that could contribute to future ill health. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

High Cholesterol

Cholesterol is a waxy fat-like substance that the body needs. Having too much cholesterol in the blood can build up in the walls of the arteries and lead to heart disease and stroke (CDC, 2012). While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, 23.7% of adults 18+ years in Los Angeles County had high cholesterol (California Health Interview Survey, 2009).

Homeless Issues

Chronic homelessness is when: ““An unaccompanied disabled person who has been continuously homeless for over one year or has had at least four episodes of homelessness in three years; or a family is considered chronically homeless if at least one member meets the definition of chronic homelessness”” (LAHSA, 2011). While data from the recent homeless count will be released soon, Los Angeles County experienced a 16% increase over the past two years in the number of homeless, men, women, and children, while the chronically homeless population grew by 1% (2013 Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count, LAHSA, June 2013).

Homicide

Homicide is defined as a death resulting from the intentional use of force or power, threatened or actual, against another person, group, or community (CDC, 2008). While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, the murder rate in Los Angeles County was 5.72 per 100,000 population (TRF PolicyMap/FBI, 2011).

Hypertension (High Blood Pressure)

High blood pressure is a serious condition that can lead to coronary heart disease, heart failure, stroke, kidney failure, and other health issues (NIH, 2012). In the hospital service area, 23.9% of adults 18+ years reported ever being diagnosed with high blood pressure (California Health Interview Survey, 2009). Chatsworth, Encino, Sherman Oaks, Studio City, West Hills, and Woodland Hills have higher hypertension rates, perhaps due to better access to medical care (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Lack of Emotional Support

Adequate social and emotional support is critical for navigating the challenges of daily life, which is the foundation needed to support good mental health. Social and emotional support is also linked to educational achievement and economic stability. While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, 28.9% of adults 18+ years received insufficient social and emotional support all or most of the time (CDC, 2005-2011).

Loss and Grief

An individual's grief for loss of a loved one can be one factor that contributes to the deterioration of health. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Lung Cancer

Lung cancer begins in the lungs. Cigarette smoking is the primary cause. Other causes include other types of tobacco, breathing secondhand smoke, being exposed to substances such as asbestos or radon at home or work, and having a family history of lung cancer (CDC, 2013). While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, the lung cancer incidence in Los Angeles County was 44.5 per 100,000 population (CDC/NCI, 2006-2010).

Mental Health (Depression)

Depression is a common but serious illness. Many people with a depressive illness never seek treatment. But the majority can get better with treatment. Medications, psychotherapies, and other methods can effectively treat people with depression (National Institute of Mental Health, 2013). In the hospital service area, 5.7% of adults 18+ years likely had serious psychological distress in the past year (California Health Interview Survey, 2009). Encino, Valley Village, and Studio City have higher rates of depression (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Nutrition

Nutrition is the intake of food based on the body's dietary needs. Poor nutrition reduces immunity and makes a person more susceptible to diseases, physical/mental development issues, and reduction of productivity (WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION, 2013). The lack of affordable healthy foods and access to grocery stores that provide fresh fruits and vegetables prevents the individual from making better food choices. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Obesity

Overweight or obesity is an accumulation of excess body fat that affects a person's overall health. It is calculated by using the Body Mass Index where the weight of the person is divided by the square of their height. Overweight is a BMI equal to or more than 25 and obesity is where the BMI is over 30 (WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION, 2012). Obesity has been identified as a health need among adults and children, and is a risk factor for other chronic diseases such as hypertension, high cholesterol, heart disease, and diabetes. In the hospital service area, 19.9% of children in grades 5, 7, and 9 were obese, while 22.6% of adults were obese (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2013).

Pain Management

Managing pain is complex with many treatment options available including medications, therapies, and mind-body techniques. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Preventive Screenings

A Pap test, mammography, colonoscopies, and other preventive screenings are necessary to ensure the long-term health of the community and to reduce the health care costs. Being uninsured and cultural beliefs may be some of the barriers to accessing these services. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Prostate Cancer

Prostate cancers are cancer cells from the prostate, which is part of the male reproductive system located just below the bladder and in front of the rectum (CDC, 2013). In the hospital service area, 1.9% of adults ages 18+ reported ever being diagnosed with prostate cancer (California Health Interview Survey, 2005).

Senior Services

Community residents identified senior services as a need in health care, home care, transportation, food assistance, and physical activity. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Sexually Transmitted Disease

Sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) are infections that you can get from having sex with someone who has the infection. The causes of STDs are bacteria, parasites and viruses. There are more than 20 types of STDs (NIH, 2012). While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, the chlamydia incidence was 34.8 per 100,000 population in Los Angeles County, and the gonorrhea incidence was 103.4 (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2013).

Stroke

A stroke, sometimes called a brain attack, occurs when a clot blocks the blood supply to part of the brain or when a blood vessel in or around the brain bursts. In either case, parts of the brain become damaged or die (CDC, 2013). Castiac, Chatsworth, Encino, Granada Hills, Studio City, Sunland, Tarzana, Van Nuys, and Woodland Hills have higher stroke rates (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).

Substance Abuse

Substance abuse is a pattern of harmful use of any substance for mood-altering purposes. Substance abuse is an important health need to address because it alters neurological functions that can have a detrimental effect on mental and overall health. In the hospital service area, 27.4% of adults 18+ years reported having engaged in binge drinking in the past year, and 10.3% had tried marijuana, cocaine, sniffing glue, or other drugs (California Health Interview Survey, 2009).

Suicide

Suicide is an indicator of poor mental health. The suicide rate in Los Angeles County is 7.72 per 100,000 population (CDC, 2006-2010). In the hospital service area, suicide was mostly identified by younger participants as an issue in their communities, and 7.7% of adults had ever seriously thought about committing suicide (California Health Interview Survey, 2009).

Teen Pregnancy

Early teenage childbearing has been recognized to have negative consequences for adolescent mothers, their children, and society as a whole (CDPH, 2011). California's teen birth rate declined from 35.2 births per 1,000 teens 15-19 years in 2008 to 32.1 in 2009. While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, Los Angeles County's teen birth rate was 33.9 births per 1,000 teens (CDPH, 2011).

Transportation

Lack of access to transportation is a barrier to accessing health and social services, especially in areas such as Lancaster and Palmdale due to the vast geography. Data was unavailable for the hospital service area.

Other key results include:

- Almost one-half of respondents rated their own personal health as healthy” or very healthy, which were the top two options using a 5-point scale. However, two-thirds rated the church community’s health status lower as somewhat healthy, and a nearly equal proportion rated the community in which they resided the same (somewhat healthy).
- The health problems affecting respondents were overweight, high blood pressure, high blood pressure, diabetes, mental health issues, cancer, heart disease, stroke, and HIV/AIDS, listed in order of having the greatest impact to the least on their lives.
- Two-thirds of respondents with high blood pressure checked their blood pressure regularly, and a similar percentage of respondents with diabetes checked their blood sugar regularly.
- While the majority of respondents reported that their weight was appropriate (51%), significant proportions classified themselves as overweight (45%).

- While the majority of respondents did not participate in unhealthy behaviors, the most common substance used in excess was food for 29% of respondents.
- While one-third of respondents slept well, two-thirds said they did not receive from sufficient rest or they did not sleep well.
- The majority of respondents reported that they were stressed or overwhelmed, with 42% saying that they were balanced.
- Respondents with children or grandchildren under age 12 reported their health concerns to be poor eating habits, no safe places to play outside, school or behavioral problems, overweight, minimal or absence of exercise, lack of access to medical care, and lack of access to dental care, listed in order of having the greatest impact to the least on their lives.
- The majority reported seeing their doctor in the past 2 years (84%), receiving regular dental care (72%), and having a support system of family or friends (90%).
- Nearly one-quarter of respondents exercise up to one time in a week, and another one-third exercise two to three times in a week. Sixteen respondents exercise every day, with 5% reporting that they never exercise.
- Lack of time was the main barrier that 30% of respondents identified as preventing them from reaching their health goal, followed by discouragement and finances by 15% each.
- The majority of respondents report that they do an ideal or good job at eating a balanced diet (51%), while 37% say they are borderline in their nutritional status.

Appendix L. Paper Survey Results

The majority of survey respondents were 25 years or less (87%), female (71%), Latino (36%) followed by Asian Pacific Islander (18%) and Caucasian (12%), not married/single (75%), with some college education (90%), incomes \$40,000 or less (75%) and had health insurance (46%).

Key results include:

- Over one-third of respondents reported that they needed to go see a doctor in the last 12 months but could not due to the cost.
- One-half of respondents reported that they go to their doctor's office most often when they are sick, followed by one-quarter going to a community clinic or free clinic.
- One-half of respondents reported having limited or no physical activity on a daily basis.
- Seven in 10 respondents reported that their health was the same as a year ago, and the same proportion rated their health as good, very good, or excellent.
- Nearly 40% of respondents consumed 5 or more alcoholic drinks in a day at a frequency of one to five times in the past 30 days; 96% did not smoke.
- Fourteen percent reported that they were obese or overweight according to a doctor, nurse, or other health professional.
- One in 10 reported high blood pressure and high cholesterol, with only 5% reporting being diagnosed with diabetes.
- Only 8% had received a mental health diagnosis, with 96% reporting their mental health status as good, very good, or excellent.
- Eight in 10 respondents reported participating in physical activity that made them sweat or breathe hard three times or less in the past seven days.
- The number of vegetables eaten in the previous day was three times or less for 83% of respondents; 38% had one can/glass of non-diet soda and 8% had 3 or more glasses. One-half of respondents eat at a fast food restaurant one to three times per week.
- Six in ten respondents reported seeing a family doctor for routine care, followed by 29% seeking care in a community clinic.
- The top 5 health concerns in the communities of the respondents were: 1) Cancers; 2) Diabetes; 3) Child abuse/neglect; 4) Obesity; and 5) Heart disease and stroke.
- The most common source of health information was a doctor/nurse (38%) for respondents, followed by the Internet (33%) and friends and family (21%).

- Nine in 10 respondents reported that their neighborhood was somewhat or very safe, with a nearly equal proportion saying the same for walking or playing in the neighborhood park.
- While the majority of respondents reporting being satisfied with the health care system, a significant proportion (38%) reported that they are somewhat unsatisfied to very unsatisfied.

Appendix M. Online Survey Results

The majority of the survey respondents were 40 years and over (86%), female (69%), Caucasian (57%) followed by African American (18%) and Latino (12%), married/living together (51%), with a college degree or a higher level of education (67%), and had health insurance or Medicare (75%). The table below summarizes the health priorities and issues that respondents identified for the community in which they resided and the church community. While the most important factors in a healthy community, health problems, and rating of community health status were similar, the identified risky behaviors were prioritized differently.

- The three most important factors in a healthy community that the respondents identified were low crime/safe neighborhoods (63%), good jobs and a healthy economy (63%), and good places to raise children (44%).
- Two-thirds rated their own personal health as healthy” or very healthy, which were the top two options using a 5-point scale. However, 57% rated the church community’s health status lower as somewhat healthy, and a nearly equal proportion gave the community in which they resided the same rating (somewhat healthy).
- The health problems affecting respondents included overweight, high cholesterol high blood pressure, diabetes, heart disease, mental health issues, cancer, stroke, and HIV/AIDS, listed in order of having the most impact to the least on their lives.
- Seven in 10 respondents with high blood pressure reported checking their blood pressure regularly, and an equal proportion with diabetes checked their blood sugar regularly.
- While the majority of respondents reported that their weight was appropriate (55%), a significant proportion (43%) classified themselves as overweight.

- While two-thirds of respondents did not participate in unhealthy behaviors, the most common substance used in excess was food for 30% of respondents.
- While nearly half of respondents slept well, the remainder said they did not benefit from sufficient rest or they did not sleep well.
- Eight percent of respondents reported being depressed, with another one-third saying that they were stressed or overwhelmed.
- Respondents with children or grandchildren under age 12 reported their health concerns to be poor eating habits (29%), school or behavioral problems (24%), no safe places to play outside (22%), and minimal or absence of exercise (21%).
- The majority reported seeing their doctor in the past 2 years (89%), receiving regular dental care (75%), and having a support system of family or friends (91%).
- Nearly one-quarter of respondents exercise once in a week, and another one-quarter exercise two to three times in a week. Only 1 in 10 respondents exercise every day, with 7% reporting that they never exercise.
- Lack of time was the main barrier that two-fifths of respondents identified as preventing them from reaching their health goal, followed by one-quarter citing pain or immobility.

Appendix N. Key Informant Interview Results

The top five most significant health problems impacting the community were:

- Obesity
- Diabetes
- Coronary heart disease
- Mental health
- Lack of access to primary/specialty care

The age groups of community residents who were most impacted by these health issues were:

- All ages
- 18-64 years
- Over 65 years

While a list of priority educational issues did not emerge, the five most significant environmental barriers identified were:

- Lack of safe areas for physical activity
- Lack of safe places to walk, play, exercise
- Not enough resources are available to residents
- Too much dependency on cars, not enough biking or walking
- Lack access to information, educational opportunities, and housing

The key informants identified the five most significant socio-economic barriers as:

- Lack of resources
- Language barrier affects the entire family
- Lack of employment
- Economic situation is a major concern for borderline low-income people who are not used to having to navigate the system or may be too proud to access the services available
- Injuries among older adults with fixed incomes

The key informants identified the three most risky health behaviors they observed in the community as:

- Drug and alcohol abuse
- Unsafe sex
- Diet and physical activity

The nine most common health issues that key informants observed were:

- Mental health issues
- Substance use issues
- Obesity
- Lack of access to care
- Lack of resources
- Transportation
- Chronic diseases
- Poor dietary habits
- Lack of exercise

A clear consensus did not emerge on the top five priority health concerns, which may be due to the diversity of the key informants. The table below shows that the more than one key informant identified overweight and obesity, diabetes, access to medical care, mental health, cancer, and asthma as the top priority needs in the hospital service area

Methodological Appendix I. Hospital Data

The CHNA team reviewed Valley Presbyterian Hospital 2012 ambulatory surgery, emergency department, and inpatient data from the California Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development (OSHPD). The OSHPD tables can be found in **Appendix H**. A total of 6,333 ambulatory surgeries occurred, the majority of which happened with patients who were 23 to 59 years (60.87%), Hispanic (52.79%), and female (59.71%). The top three diagnoses were digestive system (29.31%), other reasons (12.91%), and cancer (10.06%), while surgery digestive and pathology/laboratory accounted for 86.26% of procedures performed.

With 52,992 emergency department encounters, 44.06% occurred for patients 0 to 19 years and 39.35% for patients 20-59 years. Nearly 7 in 10 encounters happened with Hispanic patients, and 55.67% were female. The top three diagnoses were symptoms (19.39%), injuries/poison/complications (18.93%), and respiratory system (15.63%), while evaluation and management services, surgery cardiovascular, and radiology accounted for 77.63% of procedures.

For inpatient care, the average length of stay was 4.15 days. Nearly two-thirds of patients were Hispanic, and an equal proportion was female. Nearly half of diagnoses were related to births or pregnancies, which corresponds with nearly one-quarter of patients being less than 1 year and another one-third 20 to 49 years. Perinatal disorders, digestive system, circulatory system, respiratory system, and musculoskeletal system accounted for another one-third of diagnoses. Diagnostic/therapeutic, obstetrical, and no principal procedure accounted for three-quarters of procedures.

Methodological Appendix II. Who Was Involved in the Assessment

VCCC was contracted to prepare the Valley Presbyterian Hospital's 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) because of the agency's experience with facilitating groups in CHNAs, strategic planning, and community-based education sessions around various health issues. VCCC conducted the secondary and primary data collection and comprehensive asset mapping to bridge the gaps in services.

Community Health Needs Assessment Experience

VCCC was founded in 1995 by 11 health care leaders representing multiple institutions and disciplines in order to address the health care crisis facing our area when the county determined would need to close clinics and hospitals due to a severe fiscal budget shortfall. Since then, VCCC has evolved into the health and mental health planning body for the San Fernando and Santa Clarita Valleys of Los Angeles County. From 1995 to 2000, VCCC was an all-volunteer organization consisting of individuals working in hospitals, clinics,

consumer advocacy and county health care sites who shared responsibilities to create capacity reports to inform county leadership about the impact of the closure of county hospitals and clinics. In addition, the group worked together to create the first collaborative CHNA in 1994, as a result of SB 697 requirements, for our catchment area.

VCCC has a history of conducting six CHNAs that were SB 697 compliant over the last two decades, as well as a 2008 needs assessment for a SAMHSA-funded project that focused on HIV, Substance Abuse, and Hepatitis C. VCCC conducted CHNA dissemination meetings after each needs assessment was completed and presented the data at conferences and to groups wanting to learn more about completing CHNAs using a collaborative approach. VCCC's past CHNAs have been completed collaboratively with multiple hospitals, clinics, and community organizations through a process that brings stakeholders together to determine what needs to be accomplished along with what information about the community can be collected and used in the CHNA. In addition, a comprehensive asset mapping was conducted to bridge the gaps in services. Due to the strong working with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LACDPH), a department representative with health planning and data expertise has served in a leading role on the VCCC CHNA Data Committee.

Methodological Appendix III. Community Input into the Community Health Needs Assessment

The longstanding partnership and collaboration with multiple local agencies helped VCCC to identify representatives from health and mental health agencies serving the broad interests of the communities in the hospital service area. The community stakeholders that participated in the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) included residents, public health experts, and other individuals knowledgeable about health needs in the hospital service area.

Methodology for Collection and Analysis of Primary Data

VCCC used five methods to collect primary data on health problems and concerns, resources, barriers, and solutions, which are summarized in this section. VCCC solicited input from a broad cross-section of over 660 professionals, students, and community members representing multiple viewpoints in the hospital service area over a ten-month period from September 2012 to June 2013. **Appendix D** includes the data collection instruments. **Appendix I** provides the five types of community engagement methods, the location at which each event occurred, the types of stakeholders involved, dates, and a list of participants.

Focus Groups

Six focus groups were convened to gather a wide range of perspectives from 63 residents and professionals across the hospital service area. Four focus groups were conducted with community members at Antelope Valley Partners for Health, Valley Presbyterian Hospital, MidValley Comprehensive Health Center, and Tarzana Treatment Center. Another focus group was conducted with LACDHS physicians, physician assistants, and nurses at Olive View-UCLA Medical Center, with 80% having at least 5 years of experience in working with vulnerable populations. A final focus group was conducted with professors from the California State University, Northridge's Health Sciences Department. The results may be found in **Appendix J**.

Community Forums

Four community forums solicited priorities and concerns from 205 residents in the hospital service area. Three forums were conducted at the Church of the Way located in Van Nuys, which is one of the largest churches in the hospital service area with a congregation of 20,000 members. Half of congregants attend English-speaking and half attend Spanish-speaking services. The church draws its membership from a broad cross-section of the hospital service area that reflects our racial/ethnic and socioeconomic diversity. One forum was held at the Antelope Valley Partners for Health, a health and social services nonprofit organization located in Lancaster, which included clients as well as caregivers. A PowerPoint survey was created on the TurningPoint Technology response system that collected real-time polling information. The anonymity associated with the system helped VCCC to gather more honest responses. Community forum results may be found in **Appendix K**.

Paper Surveys

Paper surveys were conducted with students from two classes in Public Health Education and Health Administration at California State University, Northridge and with community residents from walking groups convened by VCCC at various LAUSD schools in the hospital service area; 205 surveys were collected. Survey results may be found in **Appendix L**.

Online Survey

An online survey was distributed via email to Church on the Way members who did not attend the community forums that reflected the viewpoints of 170 respondents. Survey results may be found in **Appendix M**.

Key Informant Interviews

Interviews were conducted with ten experienced leaders from health, mental health and public health departments, public health experts, and local hospitals and clinics that included geographic representation throughout the hospital service area. The results may be found in **Appendix N**.

Methodological Appendix IV. Assets and Resources Available to Respond to Identified Health Needs of the Community

The Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) team compiled a comprehensive list of existing facilities (community clinics, health care, and hospitals) that offer primary care and other community-based assets in the hospital service area. The list may be found in **Appendix E**.

Methodological Appendix V. Identification and Prioritization of Community Health Needs

Health needs, which are many and varied in low-income areas, arise from the comprehensive identification, interpretation, and analysis of a robust set of primary and secondary data. Following the data collection and analysis process, the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) team developed a comprehensive summary of over 40 identified needs. This summary was provided to 12 representatives that included health care experts, civic leaders, and Valley Presbyterian staff for the purpose of developing a list of 10 major health needs in the hospital service area. **Appendix O** provides a list of the participants in the prioritization process.

A two-stage voting approach was employed during a two-hour, in-person session facilitated by VCCC in August 2013. Participants used the following criteria to rank the community health needs:

1. Does the issue impact the hospital service area?
2. How severe is the problem?
3. Is the issue getting worse over time?
4. Has the community ranked the issue over other issues?
5. Are there reasonable resolutions to the problems?

First, participants were given stickers to vote and narrow the list to 21 intermediate health needs. Each participant was requested to place no more than three stickers on a particular health need. Each sticker was assigned an equal weight. The CHNA team summarized the 21 intermediate needs into a second list. Second, participants ranked what they considered to be the 10 most immediate health needs from the second list using a sticker with a value from 1 to 10. Each sticker could be used one time only, which was different than the previous prioritization round. A weighted score was determined for each health need.

Results were tabulated at the end of each round, resulting in the following prioritized list of 10 immediate health needs.

1. **Health Education (Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate)** – Health needs are many and varied in low-income areas. Health education is a preventive approach that educates the community residents on how to reduce the risk factors that could contribute to future ill health. Stakeholders noted that sensitivity to a patient’s cultural and linguistic background is a crucial factor in creating action and building self-management skills.
2. **Diabetes** – Diabetes is a condition resulting from high blood sugar levels. Health care providers deal with the consequences of this chronic condition frequently, which may be managed through a variety of measures. In the hospital service area, 7.3% of adults 18+ years reported ever being diagnosed with diabetes (California Health Interview Survey, 2011-12). Chatsworth, Encino, Granada Hills, Mission Hills, Northridge, and Woodland Hills have higher diabetes rates than other ZIP codes in the hospital service area (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).
3. **Obesity** – Overweight and obesity is an accumulation of excess body fat that affects a person’s overall health that is calculated by using the Body Mass Index (BMI). Overweight is a BMI equal to or more than 25, while obesity is a BMI over 30 (World Health Organization, 2012). Obesity has been identified as a health need among adults and children, and is a risk factor to other chronic diseases such as hypertension, high cholesterol, heart disease, and diabetes. In the hospital service area, 19.9% of children in grades 5, 7, and 9 were obese, while 22.6% of adults were obese (Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, 2013).
4. **Health Care Access/Access to Primary Care (Adult)** – A lack of access to care presents barriers to good health. The supply and accessibility of facilities and physicians, rate of uninsurance, financial hardship, transportation barriers, cultural competency, and coverage limitations affect access. This indicator is relevant because a shortage of health professionals contributes to access and health status issues. Stakeholders noted that this issue was particularly acute for the adult population. While data was unavailable for the hospital service area, Los Angeles County had 80.67 primary care providers per 100,000 population (U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration, 2011).

5. **Preventive Screenings** – A Pap test, mammography, colonoscopies, and other preventive screenings are necessary to ensure the long-term health of the community and to reduce the health care costs. Being uninsured and cultural beliefs may be some of the barriers to accessing these services. Stakeholders expressed that cost savings would be achieved if patients obtained screenings regularly in order to detect health issues at an early stage. Education on managed care should be conducted, especially as uninsured patients gain coverage due to the federal health reform law and may be unaware how to effectively and appropriately utilize prevention and wellness services.
6. **Teen Pregnancy** – Early teenage childbearing has been recognized to have negative consequences for adolescent mothers, their children, and society as a whole (California Department of Public Health, 2011). California’s teen birth rate declined from 35.2 births per 1,000 teens 15 to 19 years in 2008 to 32.1 births in 2009. Los Angeles County’s teen birth rate was 33.9 births per 1,000 teens (California Department of Public Health, 2011).
7. **Chronic Disease Care Management** – Chronic diseases are long-term illnesses, such as heart disease, cancer, and diabetes. Individuals with multiple chronic diseases need good case management in place to provide navigation through the health care system and education about managing their conditions. Key chronic conditions identified by community stakeholders include arthritis, diabetes, heart disease, cancer, and obesity, which are described for the hospital service area.
 - The percentage of adults 18+ years ever diagnosed with arthritis and related conditions is 18.8%, which is relevant since this condition is the leading cause of disability (California Health Interview Survey, 2011-12).
 - Heart disease prevalence is 5.83%, while the mortality rate is 153.92 per 100,000 population (California Health Interview Survey, 2011-12 and CDC, 2005-2009).
 - Breast cancer incidence is 123.30 per 100,000 population, while mortality is 20.4 per 100,000 population (CDC/NCI, 2005-2009).
 - Cervical cancer incidence is 8.30 per 100,000 population (CDC/NCI, 2005-2009). Colorectal cancer incidence is 45.20 per 100,000 population (CDC/NCI, 2005-2009).
 - Diabetes and obesity are discussed separately since each one was selected as an immediate health need.

8. **Mental Health** – Stakeholders commented that depression was a common yet serious mental health issue that can be addressed effectively in a primary care setting and often occurs in conjunction with a chronic condition. Many people with a depressive illness never seek treatment. Medications, psychotherapies, and other methods can effectively treat people with depression (National Institute of Mental Health, 2013). In the hospital service area, 9.5% of adults 18+ years likely had serious psychological distress in the past year (California Health Interview Survey, 2011-12). Encino, Valley Village, and Studio City have higher rates of depression (Thomson Reuters/Truven, 2012).
9. **Nutrition** – Nutrition is the intake of food based on the body’s dietary needs. Poor nutrition reduces immunity and makes a person more susceptible to diseases, physical/mental development issues, and reduction of productivity (World Health Organization, 2013). Stakeholders felt that the lack of affordable healthy foods, access to grocery stores that provide fresh fruits and vegetables, and a variety of other issues prevent individuals from making better food choices.
10. **Lack of Access to Specialty Care Providers** – Adequate specialty medical services are challenges faced when services are offered at certain health care facilities or minimal providers are available. Stakeholders mentioned specialty care access is a need for children and adults, although the implementation of federal health reform in 2014 may increase availability.
